Yale comes to Auvillar

The VCCA is delighted to partner with Yale University and Yale Summer Session for its 2010 session in Auvillar. The program is in conjunction with The Institute of Studio Studies, an institution dedicated to the use of the practice of painting and drawing as vehicles for the understanding of the creative component utilized in all disciplines. Auvillar and the ambiance of VCCA's mission as a haven for artist's studio practice provide an ideal context for the YSS@ISS goals.

Sequestered during most of the session, the program formally reveals Sitself to the Auvillar community during the final week of the program. This week is called "REPRESENTATIONS". It offers exhibits, student lectures, openings and guest participation. It is the culmination of four weeks of the rigorous study of how the actual making of work coincides with the understanding of creative processes employed in many disciplines.

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Cy Twombly, VCCA and Le Louvre

n March 23, 2010, the Louvre unveiled a new permanent installation by renowned American artist Cy Twombly, who was commissioned to paint the ceiling of the Salle des Bronzes, making him one of the few artists and the only American in history to be asked to contribute a permanent installation to the museum. Twombly, who serves on the advisory board of VCCA, was assisted by VCCA Fellow and painter Barbara Crawford, who worked with him to oversee and facilitate his commission. Barbara mixed the colors, worked on the maquette, provided oversight of the work as well as doing some of the actual painting herself. We are proud to have these VCCA connections to this historic international art event, and to establish another important link between the VCCA in the U.S. and in France.

VCCA Fellows in Auvillar 2010

Anne Alexander (July 15-28) sculptor of Windham, Maine. is the recipient of two fellowships from the Pollock-Krasner Foundation. She has exhibited at the Fullerton Museum in Massachusetts.

Robin Messing (July 15-August 5) writes novels, stories, and poetry. She lives in New York. Her novel, *Serpent in the Garden of Dreams* was published in 2008.

Barbara Blatner (July 15-August 10) is a poet and playwright from New York City whose poetry collections, *The Still Position* and *Living With You*, will come out this year with New York Quarterly Books.

Douglas Boyce (August 2-19), composer, is Associate Professor of Music at the George Washington University in Washington, DC. His works have been awarded the Salvatore Martirano Prize and the Avalon Prize.

Rob Tarbell, (August 2-19) visual artist of Charlottesville, Virginia, makes iconic drawings created with smoke captured on paper. He has exhibited in the US, China, Korea and England.

Jennifer Romine (August 12-September 2) of New York City is a screenwriter. She developed and co-produced the feature-length documentary *Paris Was A Woman*, about the women's literary expatriates of the 20's and 30's.

Jeannette MacDougall, painter, Boehme, Texas, (August 12–September 4), teaches at the Southwest School for Arts and Crafts in San Antonio. She has exhibited in California, Texas, and in France. Amy Ragus (August 23-September 16) is a visual artist from Walpole, Massachusetts, whose photo collages and drawings have been exhibited at the Berkshire Museum, Viridian Gallery, and the Newport Art Museum.

Mary Minter Krotzer (August 23-September 2) of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, writes fiction and teaches creative writing. Her work has been published in the anthologies *Before and After: Stories of New York* and *God Stories*.
